

Superintendent's Message

Rose E. Miller



This year's person of focus is Van Buren Township/Kettering native Rose Eloise Miller. Miss Miller was born on June 28, 1888, at 3225 Wilmington Pike, a white two-story home that still exists on the West side of Wilmington Pike between Devon Ave. and Marshall Rd., to parents Jacob and Malinda T. Miller. John and Marguerite Bowden (parents of Richard Bowden who grew up on the property and is one of your cemetery Trustees) bought the house and 1½ acres from Miss Miller in September of 1952, for \$18,500.00.



Rose E. Miller Home


Miss Miller attended Van Buren District Elementary School #9 that is now a white house located at 1766 E. Dorothy Lane on the South side of the road, ½ mile East of Wilmington Pike, across from Morris Sons Funeral Home. She then graduated and moved up Dorothy Lane near Wilmington Pike and attended the first four year Van Buren Township High School held in the Grand Army of the Republic Hall near the current Kettering Church Parking Lot on E. Dorothy Lane. She graduated from High School in 1905. She then attended Professor Shauck's Dayton Normal School and College. A Normal School was an institution created to train high school graduates to be elementary teachers in two years. Some of these Normal School's became comprehensive public or state supported teacher colleges and later universities such as Ohio Northern, Kent State, and Bowling Green. Miss Miller graduated in 1907, with a 2-year degree enabling her to teach elementary school. She furthered her education in summer sessions at Heidelberg, Ohio State, Miami University, and Wilmington College.



Van Buren Township School #9

Miss Miller was hired in 1907, by the Van Buren Township Board of Education to teach at the new combination Fairmont elementary/high school in 1907, which was built near Far Hills Avenue and West Dorothy Lane just West of where Saint Albert the Great Elementary School now stands and taught elementary school there until 1909. She then transferred to Van Buren Township District School #1 from 1909-1911. The school was located at E. David Road and Bigger Road near Sugar Creek Presbyterian Church and is now a private residence. In 1911, she transferred back to Van Buren Township School #9 the original elementary school she attended and taught there until 1917. In the fall of 1917, she became Principal of the new Pasadena

Elementary School at Devon Avenue and Marshall Road, now North Marshall Road. Pasadena/Rose E. Miller school was razed in 1974, but a small park was placed between the new homes that were built around the park. The original dedication plaque for the school is in a garden where the sidewalks come together. The Van Buren Township School Board then closed District Elementary Schools 1, 6, 9, 11, and 12 in 1917, and those 150 students were consolidated to the new Pasadena School. Miss Miller not only was Principal but instructor in arithmetic (grades 4 to 8), penmanship (grades 3 to 6), hygiene, agriculture, and civics (grade 7 and 8). In addition to this work, she had charge of the reading, memory work, and other activities of her room. The growth of Van Buren Township caused new additions to Pasadena School in 1929 and 1939. In 1951, Miss Miller retired from education, and the Kettering School Board renamed Pasadena to Rose E Miller Elementary School in 1957. She became a member of the Chester Roush Hall of Fame on May 17, 1983. The decline of student population in the late 1960's and early 1970's caused the closure of the school in 1971, and it was leased to the City of Kettering who named it Rose E. Miller Senior Citizen Center. In 1974, the buildings were razed, and new homes were built.



Pasadena School-1918



Rose E Miller passed away on February 16, 1967. She will be remembered for all the children's lives she touched such as my mother Mary Ellen Hopkins who wrote the following story. "In 1928, 1929 I was in 1st and 2nd grade at Pasadena Elementary School where Miss Miller was principal. The schoolyard grapevine was that she kept a paddle in her desk drawer for misbehaving students. I was a believer, and both feared and was in awe of her. Miss Miller attended my church and when I saw her there, I liked her and had no fear of her."
