Superb Intendent

A Half Century of "Digger" at David's

avid's Cemetery in Kettering, Ohio, outside of Dayton, will be celebrating its 200th anniversary next year, and we'll be sure to revisit their full story, but for now, a tip of the groundskeeping cap to Stephen "Digger" Hopkins who has been their superintendent for over one quarter of those 200 years. Last year he celebrated his 50th year in charge of the grounds. He started as a part-time worker with David's in 1967 and is now just the eighth superintendent in the cemetery's history.

David's was originally part of David's Church (both named for a local area minister), but separation of church and cemetery took place in 1890, and it has been growing ever since to its current size of over 55 acres, each one lovingly tended to by Hopkins.

"Steve loves being out on the grounds," said Terry Schimer, David's Cemetery's longtime marketing coordinator. "A lot of superintendents are in the office a lot of the time, but he goes out and still tries to do as much as he can on the grounds."

Because he has also worked at the local fire department, he's the kind of character who knows everyone in the city and is known by all. "He's a great, big, tall, gentle giant of a guy," Schimer said. "And in this business, you have to like people and like helping them. You have to be compassi onate."

Making people feel comfortable on the grounds is second nature to Hopkins. And his kindness to locals

paid off in a big way. He recently told Schimer how he met his wife at the cemetery. "Oh yeah, up there in Section D at the four-way stop," he said. "She was here with a friend of hers, and we met, and I asked her if she wanted to go out, and she did."

That was in 1975, and reportedly he was seen mowing the cemetery on his wedding day, because he lives so close by. He still shows that level of dedication 50-plus years later. Schimer said, "You know whenever the weather is bad, he's out there. He lives for the cemetery, honestly. I can't imagine ever being able to find somebody with the commitment to this place like he has."

With that personal connection, Hopkins has personally seen generations of people come through the gates of David's, where over 15,000 reside permanently, but thousands of others have been permanently touched by his kindness and attention to detail.

Superintendent's Message

This year's person of interest is Dr. Ned Schaurer Rasor, born January 2, 1927, in Van Buren Township, Montgomery County, Ohio to Floyd Olen Rasor, who was the Assistant Superintendent of the Van Buren Township schools (Kettering, Ohio) and Anna Belle Shaurer Rasor, a school teacher at Greenmont Village elementary. The family lived on Far Hills Ave., across from the Fairmont High School (now named the D.L. Barnes Building). After graduating from Fairmont High School in 1944, he attended Ohio State University, graduating in 1948 first in his class with a B.S. in Engineering Physics. Ned then earned his Master's Degree in Physics at the University of Illinois. He went on to attend Case Institute of Technology and in 1954 received his Doctorate Degree in Engineering Physics.

Dr. Rasor was married in 1947 to Genevieve Mercia Eads Rasor, who he met in elementary school. During their 74-year marriage, they raised two daughters, Julia Rasor and Dina Rasor Lawson.



Dr. Rasor worked as a Department Director for 13 years at Atomic International, Div. of North American Aviation and conducted research as a physicist on the radiation effects in nuclear reactor materials, fuel elements for high temperature nuclear reactors, and the physical properties of materials at very low (4K) to very high (4000K) temperatures. His Doctoral Dissertation subject was thermionic nuclear physics energy conversion. In his early career, he worked with the US Air Force on the integration and feasibility analysis of nuclear ram jet and space nuclear power systems. These thermionic nuclear physics form which Dr. Rasor first described form the technological basis that is powering the Mars Lunar Lander.

In 1970, Dr. Rasor used his engineering physics skills along with his cohort at the Cox Heart Institute, Dr. J. William Spickler, in Kettering, Ohio to develop and patent the first intracardiac nuclear heart pacemaker, the size of the eraser on a pencil. This new device was inserted into veins through a newly designed catheter, avoiding major surgery. In 1976, Dr. Rasor gave an example of this earliest cardiac pacemaker device to the Smithsonian National Museum of American History.

Dr. Rasor went forward to conceive and develop innovative devices for medical and energy conversion applications, and founded six companies, three of them specializing in medical devices, and the other three specializing in energy conversion for space and nuclear applications. His inventions led to over 50 patents and over 100 professional publications.

In later years, Dr. Rasor collaborated with his daughter Julia, and they co-patented fifteen further inventions, writing five publications together. Julia S. Rasor is a medical device entrepreneur, inventor and sculptor with both broad and deep multifunctional expertise in medical devices and business. Dina Rasor Lawson forged her career as an investigative journalist and author. She founded the Project on Government Oversight to serve as a nonprofit, nonpartisan watchdog over military and related government spending.

In his eighties, Dr. Rasor turned his skills toward exploring the astrophysics of dark matter and gravity, for which he published seven peer-reviewed articles. Dr. Rasor was a member of the AIAA Associate Fellows, the scientists who have accomplished outstanding contributions in the sciences and technology of aeronautics and astronautics.

Dr. Rasor was still actively researching the astrophysics of dark matter until COVID 19 struck. He passed away at the age of 93 on December 31, 2020, and is buried in Section "B" at David's Cemetery. His beloved wife Genevieve passed away on January 19, 2024 at the age of 96 and is buried alongside her husband.


